

Africanus, Leo. A GEOGRAPHICAL HISTORIE OF AFRICA: written in Arabicke and Italian; by John Leo a More, borne in Granada and brought up in Barbarie; translated and collected by John Pory. > Leo Africanus (also known as al-Hasan ibn Muhammad al-Wazzan al-Fasi) was born in Granada in about 1490 and grew up in Fez, Morocco, where he served the local Sultan. He was captured and taken to Rome in 1518, whilst on a mission to Constantinople for the Sultan. Pope Leo X employed him to provide information on Muslim intentions and tactics in Spain and Sicily. The Pope grew to enjoy his company and in due course Leo Africanus was baptised and became a person of some power in the Vatican. At the time of his capture, Leo Africanus had already travelled in the Barbary States, through what is modern-day Sudan, the Sahara and Egypt, and he had travelled on the Nile as far as modern Aswan. The book, recounting his travels and providing careful details about the geography, political arrangements and peoples he had visited in Africa, was originally written in Arabic in c.1526. Leo Africanus translated the work into Italian and it was first published in Venice shortly before his death in 1550. This English edition is exceedingly scarce. It has been suggested that Shakespeare used Leo Africanus as his inspiration for Othello. See also SABIB, vol. 3 p. 86, Mendelssohn vol. 1 p. 884-885.

The South Wales Borderers fought and were garrisoned all over the British Empire and Europe. The Regiment was part of Sir David Baird's force that captured the Cape in 1806. They next saw service in the Eastern Cape in 1877-1878. They are best known for their role in the Zulu War of 1879, as it was this Regiment that suffered the most at the hands of the Zulu army at Isandlwana. The Regiment lost over 500 men and 21 officers, and a further 12 at Rorke's Drift. The descriptions of events leading up to both battles are of great interest. Atkinson had a tough task in compiling this regimental history. It was the officers of the 24th who had pointed out Lord Chelmsford's folly in his selection of the campsite in the lee of that famous hill. The officers were even more unhappy about the splitting of the force when Lord Chelmsford decided to perform a "reconnaissance in force", thus leaving the Isandlwana camp early on the morning of the battle. This account details events before, during and after the two battles; seeks to place Colonel Glyn and the officers of the 24th in the very best light, whilst at the same time not denigrating Lord Chelmsford for his shortcomings. Seven Victoria Crosses were awarded to members of the Regiment for the defence of Rorke's Drift, and Queen Victoria decreed a silver wreath be henceforth carried on the staff of the Queen's Colour of the Regiment.

Battiss (1906-1982) was Professor of Art at UNISA at the time of publication. He conceived the book at his camp on the Limpopo River (from where he went out looking for prehistoric engravings and rock paintings), looking south to the Karoo of his birth and youth; and north to the islands of Zanzibar, Lamu, Manda and Pate which he had visited as an adult.



"This book (Churchill's fifth) is a continuation of those letters to the Morning Post newspaper on the South African War... published under the title "London to Ladysmith via Pretoria". Preface. See Mendelssohn vol. 1, p. 338-9. The print run for the two editions of this book, in October & November, were roughly half the number of the more opulently produced LONDON TO LADYSMITH. His capture, imprisonment and subsequent escape from the Boers had made him a celebrated figure across the British Empire. His first two books (on campaigns in Afghanistan and the Soudan) had enjoyed a resurgance of sales too! After his escape, Churchill returned to Durban and the Natal front. Rejoining General Buller, he expected British forces to advance towards Pretoria and looked forward to reporting on this march. Churchill found Buller and his fellow officers reticent to provide information on "top secret" plans, whilst predicting that they were soon to "go for" the enemy. Churchill happened to chat to a railway porter who told him that no advance could proceed without the construction of a major bridge! Realising action on the Natal front would accordingly be delayed. Churchill decamped to the Cape and joined General Sir Ian Hamilton's forces. This account begins in Bloemfontein and concludes with the capture of Pretoria in June 1900. Written in Churchill's inimitable style, it makes easy, interesting reading. The book includes extracts from Lt H. Frankland of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers, who was, like Churchill, captured at Chieveley and held in Pretoria. The somewhat dull original binding has been replaced by a bright red morocco spine with marbled paper in the French shell pattern. A lovely copy of one of the best known books arising from the conflict.







David (1813-1873) and Charles (1821-1873) Livingstone led this expedition, sponsored by the British Government, to investigate the Zambesi River and open the area up for further exploration and exploitation. By 1858 David Livingstone was one of the most famous people in Great Britain and was at the forefront of attempts to suppress the slave trade and bring the Gospel to Africa. This expedition did not succeed as the Zambesi had rapids and obstacles to navigation by boat that David Livingstone had not noted on his first visit. It ended in acrimony and the Government withdrew funding. Criticism of the Livingstone brothers came from the press and members of the expedition, including Thomas Baines and Dr John Kirk. The expedition did, however, return with many samples for scientific institutions.

Pager, an Austrian, came to South Africa after WWII. The research and work that went into this publication nearly bankrupted him and he was forced to sell the collection of plates in 1973. Initially purchased by the United Tobacco Company, they can now be viewed at the University of the Witwatersrand, thanks to the intervention of Dr J. Roberts of the construction firm Murray &

Roberts. The Drakensberg-Ukhahlamba (or the Barrier of Spears) is the highest mountain range in South Africa. It runs for 1000 km up the east coast. A high rainfall region, it also provided a haven for early inhabitants from the weather, predators, and in later years, other human invaders. It is estimated that there are between 35 000 and 40 000 works of San rock art in the range. In the Ndedema Gorge nearly 4000 paintings have been recorded and one cave, Sebaayeni, contains 1146. The oldest painting dates back 2500 years, but paint chips of possibly 1000 years older have also been found. Pager deals not only with the rock art, but also provides an overview of the geology, climate, botany, zoology, etc of the area. He lived in the Gorge for two years whilst documenting the rock art, using a combination of photography and draughtsmanship. The book itself is a work of art, with fourpage folding illustrations giving full evidence of the magnificence of the art work and allowing the reader to visit the Gorge from one's armchair! Pager provides minute detail, down to the type of digging stick used by the women depicted in the work. He also draws attention to the increasing confidence of the artists and, whereas the older paintings are monochromatic or red-white shaded paint application, additional colours (black, yellow and orange) were used later and the golden age (1600-1800) saw complex, well-crafted drawings. An increasing number of new arrivals and the Mfecane saw an abrupt end to this rock art and the final annihilation of the artists. This magnificent publication is an alternative to the privilege of viewing these remarkable drawings in situ.






On 14 June 1900, F.M. Roberts had signalled to Kitchener (who was at Koppies in the OFS) that he must "...put a stop to these raids on our railway

and telegraph lines...". This Proclamation follows on from the one issued on 16 June, which stated that houses in the vicinity of such damage would be burned. This Proclamation lists further that residents of towns and districts will be held responsible for damage in their districts; that citizens will have to pay a fine of at least 2s 6d over and above the cost of the damage and their receipts for goods used by the army would be cancelled and no compensation paid; the Director of Military Railways is authorised to chose someone from each district and send him on the train through his district from time to time; houses and farms in the district where damage is caused will be destroyed and the residents treated according to martial law; military authorities have to ensure that every one in their district understands and is aware of the contents of this proclamation.

Viljoen (1858-1917) fought under General de Kock in Natal whilst leading the Johannesburg Commando. He was active in the guerilla phase of the war, but was captured in January 1902. He spent time as a PoW on St Helena. Viljoen moved to America and was part of the "Boer War Circus" in that country. He became active in Mexican affairs and died in New Mexico, where he was farming. This work was based on his and his acquaintances' experiences. It is seldom seen, and never in as good a condition. Frikkie Botha was the South African Ambassador to the United States for a period.

Masekela (1939-2018) "the father of South African jazz" sang, composed and played the trumpet, cornet and other instruments. Born in Witbank, he was a teenager when he received his first trumpet from Father Trevor Huddleston. He became one of South Africa's leading musicians, but left the country after Sharpeville and settled in the United States. His successful career in music led to many awards and two honorary doctorates. He also aided anti-apartheid movements around the world. He continued to perform until just before his death.





Trotter (1863-1961) lived at the Cape from 1896-1898. She explored the Peninsula on a bicycle, sketching and recording what she saw. Her drawings, writings and archival research awakened in others an appreciation of Cape Colonial architecture of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, and the need for its preservation. Herbert Baker's chapter on the origins of Cape architecture indicates (as became more apparent with genealogical and wider research) that whilst Dutch influence was important, German and Scandinavian influences were also brought to bear on designing buildings at the Cape.







From his early career as a schoolmaster in Glasgow to being the leading educationist of the Cape Colony, Muir was very industrious. Having been appointed Superintendent-General of Education at the Cape in 1892, he remained in the position until his retirement in 1915, when he was knighted. He reformed education in the Colony (where he was also responsible for the construction of many school buildings) and he wrote volumes on mathematics. The diaries of his tours across the Cape provide an interesting insight into the region at this time.





The withdrawal of the Portuguese from Angola in 1974 left a power vacuum which was filled by three Angolan forces: MPLA, FNLA and UNITA. South African forces, in an attempt to secure the northern border of then SWA pushed deep into Angola in 1975. Operation Savannah lasted until March 1976, when SA forces had to withdraw. During Operation Savannah, SA soldiers had heavy censorship imposed on them and local SA newspapers were not allowed to carry detailed reports of the fighting, although international papers did. Savannah convinced the Botha government of the need to improve SA armaments and thus ushered in a period of intense military growth. This enabled the SADF to fight longer and more intense battles in Southern Angola in 1978 (Operations Reindeer, Revenge & Sceptic) and during the 1980s. It also taught the SADF hierarchy not to trust the politicians who they felt had bowed to international pressure. Operation Savannah was controversial in SA (35 SADF soldiers were killed) and in an attempt to allay fears, the Defence Force commissioned two histories via Brigadier Willem Otto, head of the Military Information Bureau, of which this is one. [The other is Sophia du Preez's AVONTUUR IN ANGOLA].





Rudyard Kipling (1865-1936) was born in India. His parents sent him to boarding school in England whilst very young. His experience was not pleasant, and he struggled academically, failing to obtain entry to university. After some time in India, he returned to England where he became a celebrated writer. Marriage and stints in America and South Africa followed. Despite being the trumpeter of empire and imperialism, Kipling also realised its limitations and burdens. This collection includes 16 Service Songs from the South African War. The left-facing swastika on many of his books was based on the Sanskrit symbol conferring good luck. He was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1907 and is buried in Westminster Abbey, between Charles Dickens and Thomas Hardy.
