Cohen (1854-1945) arrived in South Africa in 1872 and became a diamond buyer. He was in partnership with Barney Barnato for a while; and spent time at Pilgrim's Rest and Johannesburg before returning to Kimberley. Cohen wrote a number of articles for newspapers in both cities. His articles tended to be "sarcastic and vitriolic... and caused offence to many people" DSAB, vol. 5, p. 142. REMINISCENCES... treated many of the Kimberley magnates harshly, none more so than Sir J.B. Robinson, who sued Cohen and won. The book was prohibited, any bookdealer selling it could be prosecuted and Cohen was bankrupted. Robinson also instituted a private case against Cohen, who then spent three years in prison. He brought out several more books, but experienced financial difficulties for the rest of his life. He was a shrewd observer of people and Mendelssohn comments "many of the African magnates are handled in a somewhat rougher manner than is generally accorded to these favourites of fortune" Vol. 1, p. 251. Mendelssohn further describes the "vivid pictures he has drawn of the early days of the Diamond Fields". That vividness was to cost Cohen dearly. A scarce item.

*"Though this dictionary contains nearly all the words at present in common use, this does not exclude the possibility that many more words exist in the ... language, as may be inferred from the number of new words placed in the Appendix which were collected while the work was being printed."
Preliminary page. Kropf (1822-1910) arrived from Germany as a representative of the Berlin Missionary Society in 1845, and remained for the rest of his long and productive life. He worked on the Xhosa Bible for nineteen years, and also translated other religious works. His dictionary, first published in 1899, has been the standard English-Xhosa dictionary for generations and is still in print. Dr William Anderson Soga (1858-1948) was educated in Scotland along with his siblings. The son of Reverend Tiyo Soga (1829-1871) and Scottish missionary Janet Burnside (1827-1903), he became the first black medical doctor in South Africa. Together with most of*

his siblings, he returned to live and work in South Africa. His brother Jotello Festiri Soga (1865-1906) became South Africa's first black veterinary surgeon and helped eradicate rinderpest. Another brother, Allan Kirkland Soga (1861-1938) was a founding member of the African National Congress in 1912. Three siblings [John Henderson Soga (1860-1941), Isabella Macfarlane Soga (1864-1884) and Frances Maria Anne Soga (1868-1942)] worked in the mission field. Only Jessie Margaret Soga, contralto singer and suffragette, remained in Scotland. Elliotdale, 50 km south of Mthatha, is a town in the Amatole District Municipality in the Eastern Cape province of South Africa.

Myburgh, a documentary filmmaker and anthropologist lived with a group of 34 Bushmen for lengthy periods over seven years, and he writes from their viewpoint. When one of their number died, the funeral was held in a church, but to the distress of the members of his family, they were not allowed to look at his face and wish his spirit well as was customary, because the body had been wrapped in plastic. When a Namibian government minister visited them, he ordered a kudu be killed to provide meat. This caused dismay, as the kudu belongs to all the Bushmen and not the minister. The Bushmen believe that the land belongs to all too, and struggle to accept that lines must be drawn to indicate where they should live. A compelling account of a world view under threat.

He helped draft the Constitution that now governs South Africa and has served on numerous judicial bodies under the Constitutional Court.





Frederick van Zyl Slabbert (1940-2010) was a charismatic political leader and formidable intellectual. He grew up in difficult circumstances in Pietersburg [now Polokwane]. He studied at Stellenbosch University and pursued a career in academia before winning the Rondebosch parliamentary seat for the Progressive Federal Party in 1974. He was the Party's leader from 1979 until he left Parliament in 1986. Then, together with Alex Boraine, he set up IDASA "an independent public interest organization committed to promoting sustainable democracy based on active citizenship, democratic institutions and social justice through dialogue". IDASA's early work included facilitating meetings between members of the then banned political organisations and prominent white South Africans. One such meeting was the groundbreaking conference in Dakar, Senegal, attended by Afrikaners and exiled members of the ANC. Slabbert played several influential roles in the new South Africa, including heading up the SABC for a short time. He also led a commission tasked with making recommendations for the reform of the post-democratic electoral system. However, his frankness and straight talking did not endear him to politicians to the left or to the right.




ARTHUR ELLIOTT (1870-1938)

Arthur Elliott was born in New York. He came to the Cape as a South African War refugee from Johannesburg in 1900. He was not a professional photographer, but with a camera given to him by a friend, he initially earned his keep at the Cape by selling photographs of British soldiers and Boer prisoners of war. Elliott then began recording his surroundings and is especially regarded for his photographs of Cape Dutch houses and buildings.


Elliott's large collection (now owned by the State) provides an invaluable record of the Cape in the early 20th century. Taken mainly in the winter months, his architectural photographs are unrivalled and appear in almost every book dealing with the subject.

A number of exhibitions of his work were held during his lifetime. Elliott got historians to provide the context for the photographs and to write introductions to the pamphlets covering these events. He became a well known figure due to these exhibitions which traveled around South Africa and they provided him with an income, as it was at these events that he would sell prints such as we are offering now. They are all 40 x 50.5 cm. Elliott prints come to the market very seldom, and are rarely signed.




Horsburgh (1871-1916) was born in Poona and entered the military after Wellington College and Sandhurst. He saw service in Sierra Leone and the South African War. During the war and on his return for further service in the Orange River Colony, he became an expert on South African birdlife. He left South Africa for the last time in 1909 and retired from the army at forty. He purchased a farm in England, where he collected waterfowl and took a keen interest in all forms of ornithological life. He refused to pay the fine, but friends insisted on doing so, thus preventing his incarceration. He died in a car accident in Pretoria whilst organising support for Germany at the start of WWII.
