On 1 August 1944, John Anderson bailed out of his burning Spitfire "Springbok" over San Lorenza, landing near a German column. Whilst bullets whizzed around, Anderson was bravely led away from danger by Italian partisans. He then joined the guerrilla groups opposing Axis troops in the area. In early October they fought their way southwards to Allied lines. Anderson later returned to this part of Italy and retraced his steps. A very readable account of his adventures.






Baron von Ludwig (1784-1847) was a leading citizen of the Cape. A successful tobacconist and snuff seller, he had a great interest in botany and built up a substantial garden alongside modern day Kloof Road. He served on a number of committees and societies seeking to improve the city. He was responsible for introducing the Jacaranda tree to the Cape. His garden became a tourist attraction and upon his death, fellow citizens, disappointed at seeing his garden disappear for housing developments, agitated for the greater care of green spaces in the city.





De Villiers (1964-) played 18 test matches for the Proteas and 83 one day internationals. A gritty competitor, He was known as "Vinnige [fast] Fanie". His finest hour would come in the second test against Australia in Sydney in 1993, when South Africa was defending a mere 117 in the final innings and De Villiers took 6-43. SA won by 5 runs!


Dr Curson was an academic at Onderstepoort, the University of Pretoria Veterinary Science faculty. He published COLOURS AND HONOURS IN SOUTH AFRICA, 1783-1948 in 1948 and went on to write THE HISTORY OF THE FIELD ARTILLERY IN GERMAN EAST AFRICA in 1958 and THE HISTORY OF THE KIMBERLEY REGIMENT in 1963, and numerous other papers. Major-General Klopper notes in his foreword that badges, buttons and shoulder titles are dear to the individual soldier and fostered "esprit de corps". They provide the most visible sign of regiment or unit.





De Villiers coached the SA U-19 rugby team for three years, won the Junior World Cup in 2005 with the SA U-21 team and coached the Springboks from 2008-2011. During his tenure, the Boks beat the British & Irish Lions and won the Tri-Nations. De Villiers' outspokeness and his "colourful application of metaphor" left many rugby supporters wary. However, they could not deny that he had the loyalty of the Springbok players.




Harris (1807-1848) joined the British East India Company in 1823 as a second-lieutenant. He arrived in Cape Town in June 1836. He arranged a hunting trip and travelled northwards. He returned to Cape Town in early 1837, and went on to India for military sevice in January 1838. "One of the most important and valuable of the large folio works on South African fauna... in addition to the beautiful coloured engravings which render this work almost the most highly prized of the books relating to South African animals, every plate is accompanied by an exhaustive chapter upon the characteristics of the animal represented, as well as by a short sketch of its personal appearance...". 

Published during the height of opposition to apartheid and two years before the second State of Emergency, this is one of the most important books to challenge apartheid. Dr Heese drew on the substantial body of genealogical literature that had grown up around the well kept archives of the N.G. Church (of which his father, J.A. Heese, was Archivist). Heese did not reveal anything new, but what he did was to set out plainly (names and dates) when inter-marriages had taken place between black and white at the Cape. The reaction to his book was emotional in some quarters and legal threats and worse were aimed at him. Of particular note was that one of the ancestors of Ds. Andries Treurnicht (leader of the Conservative Party which opposed any liberalisation of government policies) was named in the book as having married "Victoria van die Kaap". Jan Hoon, Conservative MP for Kuruman and one of the most implacable opponents of liberalism in South Africa, publicly announced his intention to sue Heese. Heese invited Hoon to meet him in the Cape Archives and look at the records with him. The case never came to court! This book shook the foundation of one of the basic tenets upon which apartheid was founded. This slim paperback is scarce in this condition. One of the most important publications in South Africa since 1948. Inscribed to one of South Africa's leading academics at the time of publication.


TREKKING ON begins where COMMANDO (1929) ended. Reitz's period in Madagascar, his return to the Transvaal, his recuperation and his stay in the home of J.C. and Issie Smuts [the two people to whom I owe the most in the world, p. 59], his years as a lawyer in Heilbron, the Rebellion, World War I in German West and German East Africa, and finally his time on the Western Front. Upon his arrival in London in 1917, Reitz enlisted as a private. General Smuts, then in the War Cabinet, found out and summoned Reitz to visit him at the Savoy Hotel (where Reitz witnessed Smuts and Churchill discussing the war). Thereafter Reitz was sent to Aldershot to complete a senior officers' course"This was General Smuts' doing... I had graduated from Private to Second Lieutenant, to Major, in the course of a week" [p. 165]. Reitz went on to command a regiment and saw considerable action until the end of the war. Reitz writes with an openness and style that is

gripping and full of insight and information. This book will rank amongst the most readable books in your library, next to COMMANDO!










Signed Lawrence Green books

Lawrence Green (5.1.1900-14.5.1972) was born in Kimberley during the Siege. His father, G.A.L. Green was a journalist who was editor of the Cape Argus from 1910 to 1948. Lawrence was educated at SACS and then served briefly in the Royal Flying Corps. During World War II he served in the SAAF in North Africa. Between 1924 and 1954 he worked as a journalist and columnist on the Cape Argus as well as on the editorial staff. He started The Wanderer column which became a feature of the newspaper for decades. Green's first book was published in 1933 and he completed a further thirty-one. He travelled widely in southern and central Africa and his books reflected his experiences. In later years he would travel annually to London to carry out research, using the time on board ship to write. Although a shy and retiring man, Green was at ease with strangers and was able to make them recount memories, tales and fables which he carefully recorded and wove into his books. In a sense he was a recorder of South African oral history. His last book, WHEN THE JOURNEY'S OVER, written between bouts of ill health, was published three months after his death. In his lifetime over 500 000 copies of his books were sold. He died in Sea Point, overlooking the city, harbour and sea he had written about so often.

EXCEPTIONAL DUST WRAPPERS & FINE BINDINGS

Dust wrappers were first used in the early 19th century and by the end of that century had become fairly common. Books sold in southern Africa only began to carry dust wrappers in the very early 20th century. Before and after World War I they were often only used for display purposes by book-dealers and were frequently discarded immediately upon purchase, or, being made of flimsy paper, when damaged. Printing advances allowed dust wrappers to become stronger and more attractive between the world wars and collectors began to appreciate that they would add value to the books in their collections.

Over the years we have consistently highlighted when we have come across a book that one never normally sees with a dust wrapper. On occasion this might seem odd to the reader, as the dust cover in question might be described as damaged or even missing pieces, but experience has taught us that even in this state it is very unusual. We are proud to present a number of such books together for the first time. Some of the books below are never seen with dust wrappers and thus even a poor dust wrapper is noteworthy. In other cases we offer books in dust wrappers that are in splendid condition. In both cases examples are hard, very hard or impossible to find.... Some of the books below are finely bound in leather.



Alice Ruth Barnes (Mrs Wm. G. Barnes) was a Cape housewife who passed away in 1900. The first edition of this work came out in 1889 and sold well. The range of recipes (1163 of them) is extraordinary and far from showing the Cape as a culinary backwater show that those who paid attention could prepare dishes that would not be out of place in an upmarket restaurant in the Cape today! More impressive is that her directions are for cooking over a fire in the hearth. Mrs Barnes includes Vegetarianism as a topic, as well as recipes for dishes prepared by the Muslim community such as Sasaatjes (sosatie kerrie). Exotic dishes (crayfish patties, salmon croquettes) are listed along with Cape staples (mutton and beef and chicken dishes). Mrs Barnes' recipes show that Cape cooks did not waste, as the preparation of calf tongue and brains, neck of lamb casserole, pigs trotters etc are also listed. Preserves, pickles, jams, jellies, konfyts, home made drinks for winter and summer, sauces are all present. Hints to farmers and gardeners remain valuable today. A wonderful work to browse through.

The brief existence of the Republic of Stellaland was to prove yet another bone of contention between England and the Zuid-Afrikaansche Republiek. Rhodes saw its establishment by a local Boer, Gerrit van Niekerk, as a possible impediment to further British expansion northwards. When Kruger moved to annex it to the ZAR, Sir Charles Warren was sent to annex it to Bechuanaland for Britain in 1884. It later became part of the Cape Colony

and was named Vryburg. Dennison grew up in the Grahamstown district during the Frontier Wars and was present at the attack and capture of Sekukune's stronghold. He undertook many transport ventures to the then Rhodesia.


Dicke and his family farmed in the Duiwelskloof (near Tzaneen) in the Transvaal for many years. Dicke was obviously well acquainted and on good terms, with the local tribes and provides much information about their beliefs, traditions and history. At the same time, however, he shows himself to be very much a product of the times in the Union. Dicke indicates he took advice from Professors Dart and Hoernle, A.M. Duggan-Cronin (some photographs are by Duggin-Cronin and also Gordon Makepeace) and G.H. Franz (inspector of tribal schools in the area) during the writing of the book. Dicke was well travelled and, for example, compares beads he had seen in West Africa and Timor with beads shown to him by local Bavenda. The subject of this book was not one that drew much attention in the Union before World War II, yet this first edition of 1000 copies sold out and two further editions of 1000 copies each were rapidly published and all sold out. Most publications on this region prior to the war focused on 'white pioneers', farmers and achievements, so Dicke's view of the area was very different, but resonated with the book buying public. In later editions the photograph of the 'Magwamba Girls' (present here on p. 172) was removed.




A classic tale of mountaineering! From 1941-1946 Benuzzi (1910-1988) was held at Nanyuhi, 354 Prisoner of War Camp at the foot of Mount Kenya, which, at 5199 m, is the second highest mountain in Africa. To break the tedium of camp life, he and two others planned to climb Mount Kenya. They gathered stores and equipment (some they made and some they stole) and then broke out of camp, leaving a note promising to return in a few weeks. They endured enormous privations and two of them (including Benuzzi) summited before breaking back into the camp, hiding their equipment, having haircuts and a good sleep before reporting to the Commandant, whereupon they were promptly arrested and put in solitary confinement for escaping.




Pretorius (1876-1945) served as a chief scout for Smut's forces in the East African campaign. Before the South African War, Pretorius traded north of the Limpopo and in 1899 ventured further north into modern Zambia and Tanzania, where he became a legendary elephant and lion hunter. Sir de Villiers Graaff recounts in his autobiography how, when he was undergoing officer training in Pretoria during the early days of World War II, Pretorius was invited to address the candidate officers (who were almost all unaware of who he was). Sir Div had hunted with him some years before and thus knew the calibre of the man- he was amused to see the candidate officers' dismay at the arrival of this elderly and obviously "passed it' speaker. Pretorius proceeded to captivate his audience whilst imparting his many experiences.

Wilbur Smith based his book SHOUT AT THE DEVIL on Pretorius' experiences in East Africa during World War I. The film of the same name, starring Roger Moore and with Lee Marvin as Pretorius, was one of the standout films of 1976.

During the East African campaign in WWI Pretorius was tasked with tracking down the German cruiser Konigsberg. Local tribesmen recalled him from some years previously when he had dealt with man-eating lions that had threatened their villages. They returned the favour, and with their help Pretorius managed to infiltrate to the bank of the river close to the Konigsberg. He fled as German troops pursued him, only being saved by

darkness falling. His 'team' regrouped some days later, having used the crocodile-infested river to float away to safety. Pretorius used a dugout canoe to assess the depth of the Rufiji and once this was established, reported back to the Royal Navy who duly summonsed shallow draft vessels from far-away Portsmouth which dealt with the Konigsberg. Pretorius records (p. 29) that this whole event with its complications, dangers and success in the intense heat of the Delta took up but three lines in the Royal Navy history! He writes movingly of when he finally came to view the results of the RN handiwork and looked on the fallen cruiser, a "twisted wreck of tortured steel, made the more unlovely by broken bodies strewn at every angle". Pretorius, like F.C. Selous, met his fate as he had lived his life. In 1945 an elephant "rammed a tusk through Mr Pretorius' throat and then trampled him to death" in the Ubangi Shari area of the Belgian Congo, thus extracting revenge for the more the 400 of his fellow beasts Pretorius is reputed to have felled. A classic of Africana.


This book was banned in Malawi and the importation of copies was stopped. Short was a freelance journalist at the time of writing. Hastings Kamuzu Banda (1898-1997) talked to the "white South" and thereby lost credibility in the rest of Africa, where he had previously been regarded as a leading post-independence figure. He was rejected as a renegade who had sold his nationalist principles for economic assistance. Banda fostered a belief that only he could control the "children" of Malawi; founded "Kamuzuism" and garnered enormous wealth, some of which was sponsored by South Africa. He ruled Malawi from 1963 until forced from office in 1994 when western donors demanded a more democratic form of governance.



Roger Summers was an archaeologist and Curator of the National Museum of Rhodesia in the 1970s. He ran foul of many in that country as he attributed

the construction of Great Zimbabwe to local Africans and not outsiders. In this fascinating study Summers provides a masterful survey of mining in the Rhodesias. Although focused on gold mining, he also deals with other minerals. He points out the plentiful evidence of very early mining activity including artifacts, pottery and basic mining equipment found around old shaft entrances. Late19th century miners learnt to prospect on old sites using modern equipment, and in most cases ancient evidence was destroyed. Fortunately, some miners were careful to preserve and hand over what they found to museums, confirming the advanced methods used by early African societies.
