Colonel John Clements DFC, had an eventful war. After initial training in southern Africa, he saw service in the RAF, protecting Malta. In late 1942 he was forced to "ditch" in the sea off Sicily, and became a PoW for the next year before escaping and again flying, this time in 16 Squadron SAAF. He served in this squadron for the rest of the war, continuing in the SAAF until retirement. The book is well illustrated and carefully researched. Privately published, the edition is limited in number and copies hard to find.

Antije Krog, reporting as a journalist at the time, was struck by the seeming incoherence of the testimony and, in 2004, colleagues Nosisi Mpolweni and Kopano Ratele joined Krog in a closer investigation of Mrs Konile's words.






Myburgh, a documentary filmmaker and anthropologist lived with a group of 34 Bushmen for lengthy periods over seven years, and he writes from their viewpoint. When one of their number died, the funeral was held in a church, but to the distress of the members of his family, they were not allowed to look at his face and wish his spirit well as was customary, because the body had been wrapped in plastic. When a Namibian government minister visited them, he ordered a kudu be killed to provide meat. This caused dismay, as the kudu belongs to all the Bushmen and not the minister. The Bushmen believe that the land belongs to all too, and struggle to accept that lines must be drawn to indicate where they should live. A compelling account of a world view under threat.







Frederik van Zyl Slabbert (1940-2010) was a charismatic political leader and formidible intellectual. He grew up in difficult circumstances in Pietersburg [now Polokwane]. He studied at Stellenbosch University and pursued a career in academia before winning the Rondebosch parliamentary seat for the Progressive Federal Party in 1974. He was the Party's leader from 1979 until he left Parliament in 1986. Then, together with Alex Boraine, he set up

IDASA "an independent public interest organization committed to promoting sustainable democracy based on active citizenship, democratic institutions and social justice through dialogue". IDASA"s early work included facilitating meetings between members of the then banned political organisations and prominent white South Africans. One such meeting was the groundbreaking conference in Dakar, Senegal, attended by Afrikaners and exiled members of the ANC. Slabbert played several influencial roles in the new South Africa, including heading up the SABC for a short time. He also led a commission tasked with making recommendations for the reform of the post-democratic electoral system. However, his frankness and straight talking did not endear him to politicians to the left or to the right.


Moses Mauane Kotane (1905-1978) was Secretary-General of the South African Communist Party from 1939 until his death. Born and raised in the Western Transvaal, he joined the ANC in 1928 and the SACP in 1929. By 1931 he worked full time on the SACP's newspaper, Umsebenzi. He visited Russia in 1932-1933. As a member of the ANC he was a defendant in the Treason Trial alongside Nelson Mandela, Walter Sisulu and many others. His life story is interwoven with the broader struggle against apartheid. Bunting (1920-2008), a lifelong member of the Communist Party and a one time Member of Parliament, was banned, harrassed, detained, placed under house arrest, prosecuted and went into exile between 1963-1991. He was reelected to Parliament in 1994. He began his first speech there with the words "As I was saying before I was so rudely interrupted...". This book was banned on publication and remains hard to find. The Moses Kotane Municipality in the North West province is named in his honour.
