On 1 August 1944, John Anderson bailed out of his burning Spitfire "Springbok" over San Lorenza, landing near a German column. Whilst bullets whizzed around, Anderson was bravely led away from danger by Italians partisans. He then joined the guerrilla groups opposing Axis troops in the area. In early October they fought their way southwards to Allied lines. Anderson later returned to this part of Italy and retraced his steps. A very readable account of his adventures.





The marked difference between Sir Percy and most of his colleagues in the mining industry 80 years ago was that when he said he was going 'home' he meant that he was returning to South Africa." Introduction. FitzPatrick is best known as the author of the South African classic JOCK OF THE BUSHVELD.






Gordon Forbes (1934-2020) was an outstanding tennis player and this memoir is very engaging. Born and bred in Burghersdorp, Forbes burst onto the tennis scene when he won a title at the French Championship in 1955. He played in numerous Grand Slam tournaments and represented South Africa in the Davis Cup 14 times. Forbes was propelled into a glamorous life, but remained aware of his roots and wrote with a disarming honesty that makes this book one of the finest about international tennis. Unusual to find in hardback and signed.








met and married. In 1974 they moved to Botswana and set up camp in a very remote area, studying lions and brown hyenas. Their lives are well documented in the book. Delia Owens became especially interested in the behaviour of lionesses who remained in birth groups and maintained strong ties for life, whereas male lions moved in and out of prides. After leaving Botswana, the Owens lived in the Luanga Valley, Zambia, observing elephants and combatting poaching. The Owens are now separated and Delia went on to write a novel WHERE THE CRAWDADS SING, which became a worldwide bestseller and the subject of a 2022 film.





The survivors defended the wood for five days and six nights, following orders to hold the wood at all cost. Uys has traced what happened to the men of the battalion, and includes their biographies in the book.









During the period in question, the number of slaves declined rapidly from 9000 in 1806, until all were manumitted. This process created its own tensions and problems. Bank uses archival records, contemporary accounts and art to examine Cape slavery.


In his introduction, Bradlow notes that the original work was published without Baines's knowledge while he was still in South West Africa. His mother had sent his journals to the Geographical Society, which arranged for them to be published by Longman, accompanied by Baines's own illustrations. His mother, Mary Anne Baines, provided the preface and they were duly published in 1864. The publication of the book was to cause trouble between Baines and his companion on this journey, James Chapman.

In 1853, the Cape was an Empire backwater. Exports of wool had declined and wine was the most exported product of the Cape. Durban harbour was blocked by a sandbar and Cape Town had no breakwater or harbour. After pressure from the Admiralty, a mail service from Southhampton to "Symon's Bay" was instituted. It failed. The Indian Mutiny began in May 1857 and the Admiralty became very concerned about the Cape's relative isolation. In September of that year, the Union Company won the tender to carry the mail to and from the Cape. THE DANE was rushed into service and on 29 October 1857 anchored in the open roadstead in the shadow of Table Mountain. The journey had taken 44 days, but henceforth- and for more than a century thereafter- vessels would ply between the Cape and Southampton every week, bringing news, people and cargo. The Cape became a celebrated port of call.

On 22 September 1979 at 00.53 UTC, a "double flash" of light was detected by the Vela OPS 6911 satellite. The previous 41 double flashes thus detected had all come from nuclear weapon tests. In response, the USAF flew 25 surveillance sorties over the area. The US National Security Council suggested, with high confidence, that the flashes were the result of a lowyield nuclear explosion. The epicentre of the explosion was near Prince Edward Island, a South African possession 2000 kilometres south of Cape Town.





Howarth does not look at the dam itself or its construction, but rather at the forced removal of 35 000 Tonga tribesmen whose homes were to be flooded. Most went peacefully, but not all. Howard records the dramatic events that led to armed police being charged by tribesmen wielding short stabbing spears in defence of their homes.






Rudyard Kipling (1865-1936) was born in India. His parents sent him to boarding school in England whilst very young. His experience was not pleasant, and he struggled academically, failing to obtain entry to university. After some time in India, he returned to England where he became a celebrated writer. Marriage and stints in America and South Africa followed. Despite being the trumpeter of empire and imperialism, Kipling also realised its limitations and burdens. This collection includes 16 Service Songs from the South African War. The left-facing swastika on many of his books was based on the Sanskrit symbol conferring good luck. He was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1907 and is buried in Westminster Abbey, between Charles Dickens and Thomas Hardy.


