
Goldblatt (1930-2018) documented the effect of apartheid on South Africans. Using only black and white photographs, he depicted everyday scenes in a way which makes the viewer reconsider the subject. SOME AFRIKANERS was his second book and was considered controversial at the time. Reprinted as SOME AFRIKANERS REVISITED in 2007, this book remains a South African classic. Goldblatt describes his work as "the quiet and commonplace where nothing happened and yet all was contained". Art historian and dealer Michael Stevenson says of Goldblatt "There is no artist more important in South Africa than Goldblatt. No one else has reflected the psyche of the country over the past 60 years as he has".



Saunders, who later became head of the Department of History at UCT, was awarded a D. Phil. by Oxford University in June 1972 for the original thesis. By the late 19th century there was an enclave between the Cape and Natal still independent of white control. The Transkeian Territories were gradually, with Imperial support, brought under the control of Cape Town. Saunders examines how East Griqualand, Thembuland, Gcalehaland, Xesibeland and Pondoland came under white control. Van Heyningen's contribution was awarded a Master of Arts by UCT in June 1971.

He also makes a plea for the preservation of the "Malay Quarter" by city planners: "If this section of the city falls in the process of planning Greater Cape Town, later generations will mourn the loss of one of our last strongholds of old-world grace and charm." 






Ambrose Lomax (1867-1943) was a chemist and photographer in Molteno from 1894-1909. This collection of his photographs was found in 1960 and curated by Meintjes. It includes portraits reflecting a prosperous middle class (family groups, children & social occasions) and landscapes (including the village of Molteno) as well as scenes from the South African War. The carefully labelled glass negatives that were intact rendered photographs that are remarkable for their clarity and composition. The collection now resides in the Cape Archives.

Sandeman landed at Durban in March 1878 before travelling to Pretoria by wagon, crossing the Drakensberg near Ladysmith. He then travelled eastwards and after observing gold prospecting at Spitzkop, he descended into the Lowveld where he hunted in the vicinity of Pretorius Kop, encountering a great abundance of game.
