


The Brandberg lies 80 km from the Namibian coastline and reaches a height of 2000 m. There is evidence of hunter gatherers surviving on the rich populations of small mammals that lived in the area; and in a more recent era, grazing domestic animals near the mountains. At night, the rock shelters give off the warmth retained during the day. Shade and water are abundant and many edible plants survive in the mountains. Human settlement seems to have begun in the area around 6000 BC, and stretch through to the finding of empty bullet cartridges manufactured in Germany in the late 19th century. Pager, an Austrian, came to South Africa after WWII. His work was diligent and comprehensive, and he provides a fascinating insight into the earth's early inhabitants.

Parr was Military Secretary to Sir Bartle Frere. He was in the column that was away from Isandlwana when the Zulu army arrived and was part of the patrol that found the bodies of Melville and Coghill. See Mendelssohn vol. 2, p. 141-142. A considerable portion of the book deals with the conflict in the Eastern Cape, where the battle of Guadana was fought.

In the preface Selous states that since the publication of Baldwin's book on African hunting (AFRICAN HUNTING AND ADVENTURE FROM NATAL TO THE ZAMBESI), there has been no book "... that can be considered in any way as a guide for men about to visit the interior of South Africa in search of sport." 

Buthelezi inscribed the book to Judge Richard Goldstone (1938-) at Ulundi. Goldstone was one of only a handful of South Africans that all sides trusted in the run-up to the 1994 election. He chaired the Goldstone Commission which investigated political violence from 1991 to 1994. Much of this violence involved members of Buthelezi's Inkatha Freedom Party. Goldstone had just concluded his investigation into the Sebokeng massacre (which saw 11 killed and 281 injured) when the book was inscribed. The Goldstone Commission's findings would lead to a number of policemen being charged with murder.

Jack was Jack Cope, her lover, and Anna, her sister. Nelson Mandela quoted from her poetry in his speech at his inauguration as South Africa's first democratically elected president in 1994.

Captain Haldane was captured by the Boers at the same time as Winston Churchill. Churchill escaped, but Haldane and another were spotted by sentries and dared not make the planned attempt. They hid within the prison for a time, and finally managed to escape when the other prisoners were moved and the building was left deserted. They made their way to safety on board a truck attached to a train bound for Delagoa Bay. See Mendelsohn, vol. 1., p. 669-670.


